If you have any information about your child's allergies or diet requirements it is vital to make it known to the class teacher.







4. If you want to take your child out of school early you must phone the office before or write a note informing the school. The visitor book in the office should be signed for **all** visits.

5. Children are not permitted to leave the school or school grounds without parental permission.

6. Please put your child's name on all clothes, coats, PE uniform school bags, lunch boxes/bags etc.

In September your child will be starting school for the first time. For many this will be a new and unsettling experience. Prepare your child for coming to school by talking about the school.

The school operates a 'staggered intake' in Primary 1, to help the child and teacher get to know one another.



Healthy Breaks

At Colman's Primary School we want to encourage healthy eating and have consulted with parents, staff and pupils and as a result we have adopted a Healthy Breaks Policy. We have worked with health professionals to develop this policy. As part of our Healthy Breaks Policy, all our children will be encouraged:

- + To eat fruit, vegetables or bread based products at break time
- + To drink milk or water at break time.

Milk is available for the children. This is paid termly and the cost of this varies from term to term.

Before School

Don't worry...

Some children take time to settle. Some cry a little. The odd one cries a little more.

Most will settle very quickly.

For the first few days you should bring your child into the classroom but leave as soon as the child seems settled. Then after a few days encourage your child to say bye at the door and to come in by themselves or with friends.

Positive Behaviour

In St. Colman's Primary School we seek to create a climate in the school that will:

- Promote learning for all pupils
- Promote effective teaching
- Enhance self-esteem and foster self respect for others
- Develop greater independence by accepting the need for self-discipline, self-control and take responsibility for own behaviour
- Develop the pupil's interpersonal skills and their ability to work co-operatively with others to resolve problems and potential or actual conflict
- Have the endorsement and active support of the parents.

In cases where a child has misbehaved there are sanctions as outlined in the School Positive Behaviour Policy. Where there is a serious breach, parents will be notified or invited to the school to discuss the matter.

Before School

Rushing in the morning can be upsetting for young children. It's a good idea to try and have everything ready the night before.

At home time please be punctual when you are meeting your child. Children will worry and fret if they have to wait to be collected.

Helping around the house can be a real bother for you...but great fun for your child! It is important to talk to your child as much as possible whilst he/she is helping you.

It is important to teach children to fend for themselves. The more <u>independent</u> your child is, the quicker they will <u>learn</u>.

Homework

School can make a big difference to your child's life but when school and home work together the outcomes can be amazing and give all children the chance to reach their full potential.

We see a real value in children engaging in homework. It gives them an opportunity to consolidate the work done in class, and to prepare for work to come. It involves parents helping with their children's work and encourages good working habits. However, it must be stressed that it should never be a source of anxiety or worry.

Homework is given daily, though this may be relaxed on special occasions.


P.E. Uniform

Do not discuss school incidents with other pupils or staff in front of your child. This can be very demoralising

• Remember the story your child tells you is only half a story. The other child/children involved have their story and very often the truth is somewhere in between.

REMEMBER: School is a preparation for life. In the real world not everyone is happy all of the time, or get everything they want - when they want it. In work places there are often many differences, difficult days, jobs to be completed on time and rules to follow. In school the children will face different challenges and disappointments and however difficult it may be to resisting the urge you can't fight all your child's battles for them. It is difficult but they will get over minor disappointments and learn from the difficulties. Through facing these challenges they will learn valuable lessons, grow in independence, learn how to communicate more effectively with others and resolve conflicts.

Reading

The P1 children will learn to read through 'shared' reading lessons. Initially they will be introduced to wordless books which are used to encourage the child to discuss the pictures and retell the story using picture cues. So do not expect a reading book to go home straight away. Some children learn faster than others. You can help by reading stories to your child and talking about the pictures in the book. Gradually your child will be introduced to first word books and then simple sentence books.

TALKING to your child is the first step in learning to read.



LISTEN to your child. **ENCOURAGE** him or her.

Books are going to play a big part in your child's life, so reading books and stories to

them is

invaluable. A love of books is one of the greatest gifts you can give your child .

Children like to copy their parents so if they see you read regularly - whether it is a newspaper, magazine or novel - your child will want to copy you. Some boys may be less interested in reading and slower to start and they will gain particularly if their dad or another male person reads to, or with them.

We are an Accelerated Reader School.



Writing

Every child likes to make their own

marks and scribbles should be encouraged. Give them different sizes, shapes and colours of paper to experiment with. To adults, these marks children produce may often appear meaningless but they are meaningful to the child. All efforts should be praised. Ask them to tell you about their work. Help show them how to grip a pencil e.g. pinch grip. Children learn important life skills from their families. These basic skills are seen as very important and should be encouraged and practised until they become automatic.

- Saying please and thank you
- Set clear boundaries for your child
- When you say "no" you mean it
- Be consistent do not give into tantrums
- Ensure your child tidies toys away when they have finished playing.
- Encourage your child to develop their concentration by persevering at an activity until they have finished it

• Play games with your child that will help them accept that they will not always win snakes and ladders, matching games, etc.

• Encourage your child to wait their turn and share with others

• Use praise consistently when your child does as you have asked.

Numeracy is about more than numbers.

Counting, Matching, Sorting, Shape, Volume, Time and Making Patterns

Activities in which you count out, match and sort, shopping, baking, cooking, setting the table, counting coins and games which involve counting (e.g. ludo, snakes and ladders, skipping etc) all help your child to remember the sequence of numbers and to realise what the number actually mean. If your child wants to write numbers show them how to do this correctly in a tray with sand, flour or sugar in it. If you would like any more information about this please speak with me or your child's class teacher.
